<u>Pastor's Meditation</u> <u>October 2023</u> The Sincere Pumpkin Patch

For probably the first 10 years of my conscious life, each October I watched, "It's The Great Pumpkin, Charlie Brown" on TV. This 1966 animated TV special was created on the heels of the wildly popular "A Charlie Brown Christmas." When "Great Pumpkin" was first aired, nearly half of American TV viewers watched it. (Lind, Stephen J. (2015). A Charlie Brown Religion: Exploring the Spiritual Life and Work of Charles M. Schulz. Univ. Press of Mississippi).

Part of the story deals with Linus' expectation of a Halloween visit from the mythical "Great Pumpkin." Linus searches for a "sincere" pumpkin patch in which to hold his vigil. Finding such a patch, he foregoes the pleasures of trick-or-treating to await The Great Pumpkin. He says, "Each year, The Great Pumpkin rises out of the pumpkin patch that he thinks is the most sincere. He's gotta pick this one. He's got to. I don't see how a pumpkin patch can be more sincere than this one." (Spoiler alert! - read no further if you've never seen this 1966 program: The Great Pumpkin never shows up.)

Viewers know that Linus' pumpkin patch is "sincere" but based on false understandings. Sincerity is a great trait to which everyone should aspire. However, we must acknowledge our human ability to be sincerely wrong.

Where can we find truth? Before I answer that question, I encourage you to run (and hastily!) away from anyone who claims to have all the answers. I certainly don't. This is why I return, over and over, to Scripture trying to find God's answers, because I believe God inspired the scriptures. John 8:31-32 goes like this: *Then Jesus said to the Jews who had believed in him, 'If you continue in my word, you are truly my* disciples, ³² and you will know the truth, and the truth will make you free."

"If you continue in my word." Jesus talks as someone in authority, who has a "word" to deliver, in the way that we call the scriptures "the word of the Lord." If Jesus is the Son of God, his "word" is over and above all of scripture. Followers of Jesus who seek to know him should pay close attention to the words he is quoted as saying.

Just for fun, find an old "red-letter New Testament," where the words of Jesus appear in red. Open it up and read only the words in red. Sure, the black-printed words in-between provide context and structure, but the words in red show Jesus' reaction to the world around him. And if Jesus is who he professed to be, his words are God's reaction to a world that, like Linus, was sincere, but sincerely wrong.

Flapjack Update

A group of interested church members met again to discuss the possible return of our monthly Flapjack Saturdays. We have not been able to do this since Covid arrived, and we have many new members who do not know of this wonderful tradition. Let me provide some background to bring everyone up to speed and to determine whether it is feasible to try this again.

Pastor Steve Hartman with Jeff Phillips and Kathy Ahl began a monthly all you could eat breakfast consisting of pancakes, scrambled eggs, sausage, coffee, juice, and blue berries with whipped cream complimented by real maple syrup. The proceeds from the breakfasts went into the General Fund, out of which expenses were reimbursed. In turn, Missions Board would designate a charity for that month, and give that charity \$500, which was more than any breakfast's "profit," (proceeds minus expenses).

It takes a Church Village to manage breakfast. The process begins with publicity, volunteer sign ups, and mission selection of a benefactor. The week of the breakfast, Friday afternoon is set up requiring about 8 volunteers to set tables, organize the kitchen, and bundle silverware. Meanwhile, the volunteer shoppers will have purchased dozens of eggs, pounds of pancake mix, gallons of juice and milk, boxes of sausages, pounds of butter, and whatever else is needed. All this must be brought back to church and put in the proper places.

Flapjack Saturday requires about 25 volunteers to succeed. Jobs include: money collection, batter mixer, pancake cooker, egg mixer, several egg scramblers, coffee maker and server, 3 dishwashers, 2 to 3 plate fillers, 7 or 8 waiters, sausage chef, and a kitchen coordinator. Let us not forget cleanup; tables must be washed and put away, chairs stacked, dishes, pots, utensils washed and stored, supplies secured, and garbage carried to the dumpsters.

Saturday starts with the coordinator at 6:15 opening doors and starting the ovens and burners. Food preparers arrive at 7:15, the rest of the kitchen staff arrives around 7:30 with waiters at 7:45. Breakfast has been from 8 to 10. Clean up is complete by 11:15 or so. (A long morning, but great fellowship and fun.)

Most of the jobs require standing and constant activity. Please consider whether this activity might be of interest. Next, can you physically do the work. And lastly, can you commit to helping monthly over the next 6 months.

If you are interested, please contact Saundra at the office by phone or email and indicate that you are willing to help. If there is a specific job you would enjoy, advise us of that too. We are affiliated with American Baptist Churches of the Rochester/Genesee Region, and nationally with the American Baptist Churches, USA.


