#### Pastor's Meditation July 2023

Annette's parents, Warren and Lenys Hazen, were married for over 57 years. They met around 1938 and began an on-and-off courtship that ran nearly 10 years until their marriage on Christmas Eve, 1948. After a long pause during the courtship, they began talking again as Warren considered asking Lenys to marry him. Part of family lore is Warren's question to Lenys: "Do you go to church?"

She replied, "Yes."

Then he asked: "Does it mean anything to you?"

The Pew Research Center recently asked a similar question to a sampling of the

American public: "The 2021 NPORS (National Public Opinion Reference Survey) ... asked respondents how often they pray and how important religion is in their lives." Regardless of how one defines "religion," religion is still important to many Americans. However, the numbers are declining: "Today, fewer than half of U.S. adults (45%) say they pray on a daily basis. By contrast, nearly sixin-ten (58%) reported praying daily in the 2007 Religious Landscape Study, as did 55% in the 2014 Landscape Study. Roughly one-third of U.S. adults (32%) now say they seldom or never pray, up from 18% who said this in 2007."

The survey goes on to report, "Still, the available data indicates that Americans are growing less religious by this measure, too. Random-digit-dial (RDD) telephone surveys conducted in 2017 and 2019 found fewer U.S. adults saying religion is "very important" in their lives compared with previous telephone polls. And the 2021 NPORS finds that 41% of U.S. adults now say religion is "very important" in their lives, 4 points lower than the 2020 NPORS and substantially lower than all of the Center's earlier RDD readings on this question."

The causes for this phenomenon are not completely clear. Some commentators blame distractions, such as youth sports, Sunday football and entertainment-on-demand. Others cite weakening family structures and the decline of the traditional Monday-Friday 40hour workweek. Yet others blame religious leaders' advocacy for one political party over another. This particular commentator speculates that it's not an "either-or" cause, but more of a "both-and." I've known plenty of young people and parents who couldn't attend Sunday church because of competing Sunday morning practices. I've experienced, in my own life, the pull of Sunday football. I've known people who would not attend church after their family fell apart because it was too embarrassing. I possess strong political beliefs, but I've seethed as corrupt so-called "faith leaders" cozied up to one politician and party, completely abdicating their one responsibility to represent God. God existed long before political parties and God will live on, forever after the Democratic and Republican parties are disgraced and extinct.

My approach to these challenges is to look at Scripture and address what we can. Where in the Bible does it say church must always meet on Sunday? Where does it say that our lives need to be perfect before we can enter worship? Opening up the Bible, I can discern what is said (and not said) about important issues. I consistently refuse to endorse any candidate from the pulpit, so no politician will ever "own" me. I strive for the basics and

encourage you to so as well: Read Scripture. Consider. Communicate with God (which means talking, as well as listening). Ask for the presence of the Holy Spirit and don't let up. Ask God for help. Ask God for healing. Ask, seek, knock. (Matthew 7:7-8).

Back to Warren's question: Did church mean anything to Lenys? She answered, "yes," and then served the church, and moreover, her Savior, at times mightily, during her long and fruitful marriage. Does church mean anything to me? I answer, "yes," not because those are the words you're expecting a pastor to say, but because I feel my very calling, my very soul, requires it. A Christian church only means something if it serves Jesus Christ. And I want church to mean something more and something more again, to me and everyone else.

Over 75 years ago, my father-in-law posed good questions to his future partner:

---

"Do you go to church?" and

"Does it mean anything to you?"

What are your answers?

#### **Missions Report**

At the time of this writing, the America for Christ special offering is about at the halfway mark. The Missions Team is pleased to say that at this juncture, over \$850 has been donated for bringing "Grace Upon Grace" to people in the United States and Puerto Rico who need hope and healing from difficult and devastating circumstances. We thank you for your donations.

American Baptist Churches Rochester-Genesee Region (ABC-RGR) is an important local resource for our church. In June we designated \$1,000 from our Missions budget in support of their work, "shaped by the values of respect, Godly justice and reconciliation." (quoted from abcrgr.org) We have also designated \$500 for the Penfield Ecumenical Food Shelf (PEFS) on Jackson Road because their need to provide food typically increases during the summer months when schools are not in session.

#### **Notes from the Trustees**

The Capital Fund Drive to cover the cost of tree removals at 1866 Penfield Road and roof replacement on the east side of Old Fellowship Hall, meeting room and bathrooms officially ended June 30<sup>th</sup> but all pledged funds and additional contributions are still welcome. To date we have collected about \$12,300.00 with an additional \$2,200.00 pledged but still outstanding. If you have not yet contributed and are considering doing so, there is still time.

The new east roof on Old Fellowship Hall has been completed. When the roofing was removed on Thursday, June 15<sup>th</sup>, 60 plus sheets of plywood were replaced due to water damage, adding about \$4,000.00 to the cost of the project. The new total for the replacement project is \$19,000.00. Cameron Roofing did the project and was very professional to work with.

This summer, PVNS (Penfield Village Nursery School and Kindergarten) will be painting their portions of the education building. The work will entail painting all three floors of the PVNS stairway, the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> floor hallways, the hallway leading to the gym (Old Fellowship Hall), the foyer outside OFH and the ceiling in both areas. The Trustees agreed to this \$7,000.00 improvement in lieu of rent increases for the next 3 years. Additionally, PVNS is looking to make improvements to the playground, including replacing the stone and grass with small patch of playground mulch. The

anticipated cost is approximately \$12,000.00. The fresh paint and playground improvement will be a welcome upgrade.
