Pastor's Meditation

“Who is Your “Lyle”?”

In 1999, Disney released a movie directed by a David Lynch. Lynch was known for directing unusual projects, such as *Blue Velvet* and the *Twin Peaks* TV series. For Disney, though, Lynch “played it straight,” directing an accessible, heartwarming film, appropriately titled, *The Straight Story*. This film is based on the true story of an elderly Iowan named Alvin Straight. In the early 1990s, due to failing eyesight, Straight lost his driver’s license. In 1994, when his brother

Henry (named “Lyle” in the movie) suffered a stroke, Alvin rode his John Deere lawn tractor 240 miles to visit his brother in Wisconsin. The movie depicts Straight’s slow, uncomfortable journey as kind of a penance for a broken relationship. Along the way, Straight witnessed some beautiful fall scenery and encountered a number of people who both inspired and were-inspired by him. Hitting nightfall just a few miles from his brother’s house, he camped near a church. The minister came out to offer him food. Here is their conversation from the movie script:

Alvin Straight: *Well, Lyle and I grew up as close as brothers could be. We were raised on a farm in Moorhead, Minnesota. We worked hard. My mom and dad darn near killed themselves tryin' to make that farm work. And me and Lyle would make games out of our chores. We'd dream up something about racin' and wagerin', do anything to keep our mind off the cold. Lord, it was cold. He and I used to sleep out in the yard every summer night if it wasn't pourin'. Nine months of winter we couldn't get enough summer. We'd bunk down when the sun went down. We'd talk to each other until we went to sleep. We'd talk about the stars and whether there might be somebody else like us out in space, pretty places we wanted to go and it made our trials seem smaller. Yeah, we much talk each other into growin' up.*

Minister: *Oh, whatever happened between you two?*

Alvin Straight: *Story as old as the Bible, Cain and Abel. Anger, vanity. You mix that together with liquor, and you've got two brothers who haven't spoken in ten years. Well, whatever it was that made me and Lyle so mad...don't matter anymore. I wanna make peace. I wanna sit with him, look up at the stars... like we used to do so long ago.*

Minister: *I say "Amen" to that.*

I won't spoil the ending for you. You'll have to watch the movie to see if the brothers ever got back together to look up at the stars.

I simply want to ask you, "Who is your Lyle?" Who are you estranged from that used to be your friend? Can anything be patched up? Can anything be healed? Can it be said that whatever divided you "Doesn't matter anymore?"

Jesus is our example. Romans 5:8 declares, "But God proves his love for us in that while we still were sinners Christ died for us." Jesus did not wait for us to settle our differences before dying on the cross to reconcile us with God. While we were yet sinners, he made that reconciliation possible.

Could you simply go up to your "Lyle" and reconcile? Could you consider the things that separate you and declare, "It doesn't matter?" How you answer these questions may have a

huge impact on your soul and upon the journey that you take.

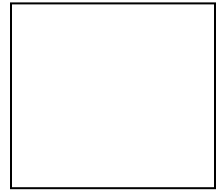
